Local Practices for Mission Emphasis Week 2022

Not only do 'Love' and 'Listen' start with the same letter in English, but they also are inextricably linked as Christian practices. To listen attentively, genuinely is to love. To love is to be willing to listen to the other, openly, non-judgmentally, even when it might be inconvenient, awkward or difficult. As we listen in love and love through listening, we discover and participate in what Spirit is already doing for the sake of the world God so loves.

This week we invite you to join us in being attentive to and expressing God's love as we learn (or relearn) and practice listening to Spirit through the text, one another and our neighbours. Along with these daily devotions, we encourage you to participate in one or more of our **virtual 60-minute guided conversations** where we will share stories, reflections and questions as we together seek to discover and join Spirit on God's mission of loving and saving the world. Format

In this devotional series, we'll explore the most familiar Bible verse, John 3:16. Each day, we will DWELL in the text; DIG a little deeper and ponder its meaning and application to our lives and neighbourhoods; finally we will be invited to DO something in response: DWELL- DIG- DO. If you will be using these devotions in hard copy, be sure to have check for the day's videos and songs beforehand so you can watch and listen along.

The daily devotionals may be engaged individually, with a partner or as a household. To facilitate ease of use, most of the time the singular or plural will be used (not both) but please adapt by employing the appropriate pronoun (my/our, me/us) according to who's participating. Whether we are participating on our own or with others, let's remember that we are always in the company of saints both near and far; together we pray *OUR Father....*

Dwell

The invitation to dwell in the text is ancient, simple, and profound. It's an opportunity to listen to the Spirit through the text, one another, and our contexts. It is also a posture that moves us to not only dwell in the text, but to make space for the text to dwell in us—shape, challenge and guide us.

Lectio Divina ... is not reading to acquire new information or to learn a critical skill. Rather, it is a form of devotional reading in which we allow God to "read" us and respond to our deepest desire... Most important is how we read—not to understand or control God, but to be understood and formed by God... Spiritual reading, therefore, is slow, deliberate, meditative reading in which we allow the words to penetrate our heart and question our spirit. Henri J.M. Nouwen, Discernment: Reading the Signs of Daily Life 2013.

These questions are intended to guide your daily Scripture pondering:

What words or phrases stand out to you (is the Spirit highlighting)? (You might find it helpful to actually highlight them!) Why do you think?

What are you wondering about as you ponder the text?

What might God be saying to you? To your neighbours?

How might the Spirit be nudging you to respond?

Journal your responses and if/when pondering with a partner/household, share with one another.

Note: Unless otherwise indicated all Scripture texts are quoted from the <u>New Revised Standard Version</u>.

DIG

Having read the text *again for the first time*, some questions and reflections are included for us to 'dig' into and apply the text a little more.

DO

One of our key words for this series is "Listen" but 'listen' means a lot more than just hearing the sound waves in our ears. Watch this short video, <u>Shema - Listen - Bing video</u> to learn about how from the Bible's perspective, to listen is to obey- to act on what we hear.

Listening thus requires effort and practice. It begins by paying attention to what is being said and to what we observe/see when we *actually* look. It's about 'dwelling' in the word (see above), in the moment, and our neighbourhoods such that we notice, reflect and respond in multiple ways to God's grace, love and missional activity here and now.

In following, the 'Do' section includes suggested action steps and prayer prompts to guide us in responding to and putting into practice what we learned.


To further help us in our 'listening' each day, there is an invitation to choose a word that reminds us of what we heard during our devotional time, write it on a labyrinth 'stone' and think about it during the day. Stones helped God's people listen and remember...

'Stone Pathway'

When God's people cross over the Jordan, they are instructed to build an altar of stones to the Lord and to write God's words on them (Deut. 27:2-6, Joshua 8:30-32). When Elijah went 'head-to-head' with the priests of Baal, he made an altar with "twelve stones, according to the number of the tribes of the sons of Jacob" (1 Kings 18: 31, 32). Over and over again God invites his people to remember the Lord's presence and activity, and on a good number of occasions, to do so with stones.

Each day of our journey, we will mark 'a stone,' on our path by writing a word that stood out for us during our devotional time on it and thinking about it during the day.

Hold these words in your heart and mind in the days ahead – how do they speak to you in your everyday relationships and contexts? What questions, challenges or encouragement do they prompt? How might the Spirit be nudging you to respond?

DAY ONE: For God Sends

Dwell

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, and invite Spirit's leading.

Think about who God is. What Names, titles, descriptions of God come to mind? List them.

Now, focus your attention on the texts. Read them slowly, contemplatively:

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

[God to Moses] Now go, for I am sending you to Pharaoh. You must lead my people Israel out of Egypt." Exodus 3:10

[God to Joseph] God sent me on ahead to pave the way and make sure there was a remnant in the land, to save your lives in an amazing act of deliverance. Genesis 45:7

[God to Gideon] Then the LORD turned to him and said, "Go with the strength you have, and rescue Israel from the Midianites. I am sending you!" Judges 6:14

[God to Ezekiel] Son of man," he said, "I am sending you to the nation of Israel, a rebellious nation that has rebelled against me. Ezekiel 2:3

And the Lord sent Jerubbaal and Barak, and Jephthah, and Samson, and rescued you out of the hand of your enemies on every side; and you lived in safety. 1 Samuel 12:11

Samuel said to Saul, "I am the one the Lord sent to anoint you king over his people Israel; so listen now to the message from the Lord. 1 Samiel 15:1

The Lord sent Nathan to David. 2 Samuel 12:1...

Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I. Send me!" Isaiah 6:8

...for in truth the Lord sent me to you to speak all these words in your ears. Jeremiah 26:15

...the Lord sent prophets to the people to bring them back to him. 2 Chronicles 24:19

There once was a man, his name John, sent by God to point out the way to the Life-Light. John 1:6 (MSG)

Read the verses again with these questions in mind:

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

What are you wondering about as you ponder God's Word?

What might Spirit be saying to you?

How might Spirit be nudging you to respond?

DIG

What names, titles, descriptions of God did you list above?

Did "Missio Dei", Missionary God, Sending One as God is described in these verses, make your list?

Think about God as the sending God, the Sent and Sending One...

Today, we are becoming more aware of the fact that <u>God is missional</u>. God's very nature, being and action are missional. God sends and goes on mission in person and in place as the verses above and in so many of Scripture's stories, illustrate: God sent Esther to the King's palace, Ruth to Bethlehem, Deborah to Mount Tabor, Jonah to Nineveh, the Israelites to Babylon...

Who else did God send?

If God is Missio Dei, then

(Complete the sentence and ponder the implications).

Journal your reflections and responses and if/when dwelling with a partner/household, share with one another.

DO

Pay attention to being sent and sending today. Who sends you- to whom, to do what? Who do you send, to whom, to do what?

How might this reflect the very nature of God?

Describe your neighbourhood, the place where God has sent you... you may want to look out the window, sit outside or go for a walk to develop your description.

Choose your word for the day, write it on your labyrinth (or a real stone) and ponder it throughout your day.

DAY TWO: SENT HIS SON

DWELL

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, and invite Spirit's leading.

What have you been pondering from yesterday's reflections?

What if God is not only the Sending One but the Sent One?

Dwell in the texts. Read them slowly, contemplatively:

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. John 3:16-17

The Word became flesh and blood and moved into the neighbourhood. We saw the glory with our own eyes, the one-of-a-kind glory, like Father, like Son, Generous inside and out, true from start to finish. John 1:6, 7a, 14 (MSG)

...God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners. Romans 5:8

[Jesus] told them, "Don't you realize that there are yet other villages where I have to tell the Message of God's kingdom, that this is the work God sent me to do?" Luke 4:43

[Jesus] "He who receives you receives me, and he who receives me receives the one who sent me." (Matt. 10:40; Mark 9:37; Luke 9:48).

Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of him who sent me and to complete his work. John 4:34

Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." John 6:29

Then Jesus answered them, "My teaching is not mine but his who sent me. John 7:16

Jesus then said, "I will be with you a little while longer, and then I am going to him who sent me. John 7:33

Creator showed his love for us by sending the only Son who fully represents him into this world, so that we could live through him. 1 John 4:9 FNV

Read the verses again with these questions in mind:

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

What are you wondering about as you ponder God's Word?

What might Spirit be saying to you?

How might Spirit be nudging you to respond?

DIG

After sending numerous prophets, priests, judges and royalty, God sends Himself. Jesus identifies Himself as the One sent by God. Notice how this is expressed in the verses above.

Ponder Jesus as the Sent One:

In John's Gospel, Jesus uses the Greek verb *pempein* to refer to "the Father who sent me" no fewer than 24 times. These references put the focus on the Father, who through this action of sending authorizes and empowers the Son in his mission. In another seventeen passages, however, some form of the verb *apostellein* is used to focus instead on Jesus, as the one who is sent. This verb invests Jesus' acts with the full authority of the Father because he seems to do only what the Father wills.

Jesus' mission is described as a unique expression of the Father's love for the world.

"In John 3:16-17, the "sending" relationship between the Father and Son frames Jesus as God's gift for the world. For John, this embodies the nature of God's love for the world (see also John 3:16; 1 John 4:10). The purpose of this giving or sending is to save the world, not to condemn it." John Painter, "God as Sender, Jesus as Sent", n.p. [cited 28 Aug 2022].

Why do you think Jesus came as the sent and sending One?

Clearly one reason is because God loves so much. Because God is love. (1 John 4:8,16)

Consider (and discuss) how love and God's missional nature go together?

How would you describe God's love and therefore God's missional nature?

(Here are a few examples to get you started: unconditional, everlasting, personal, extending itself, always about the other, inclusive...)

For God so loved the world that...

- (Complete the sentence in your own words, be creative, think expansively)
- Ponder the implications...

As Jesus unveiled God before a surprised and unready world, so must we. Love is that important. ... Our love must 'come in the flesh', just as God's love did. -- N.T. Wright

Journal your reflections and responses and if/when dwelling with a partner/household, share with one another.

Choose your word for the day, write it on the next stone in your listening labyrinth (or a real stone) and ponder it throughout your day.

DO

Pay attention to signs of God's great Love for the world today.

As you have 'dwelt' in the text, listening to Spirit, 'saunter' around your neighbourhood with the same attentive, listening, posture.

"To "Saunter" means to wander and walk in a slow and relaxed manner. It comes from the French phrase, "a la Sainte Terre" - "to the holy land" and reminds us, that all of our steps are on holy ground." - Brian Draper

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, invite Spirit's leading and focus your attention on your street.

As you 'saunter,' enjoying a walk in your neighbourhood, consider:

- Who is on the street? What are people doing?
- What surprises you? What raises your curiosity?
- What creates concern or questions?
- What might God be up to? i.e. Where are there signs of God's love at work?
- Is there anything that catches your attention in a way that makes you want to ask more questions or get more information?
- What might Spirit be saying to you?
- How might Spirit be nudging you to respond?

Upon your return, record and reflect on your observations.

DAY THREE: For God Sends US!

Just for fun, correct these verses by replacing the underlined phrases with the correct words.

DWELL

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, and invite Spirit's leading.

Think about how you identify yourself in relationship to God. Do you call yourself a believer? A Christian? A disciple of Jesus? A missionary? God's sent one?

Focus your attention on the texts. Read them slowly, contemplatively:

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

The Lord now chose seventy other disciples and sent them on ahead in pairs to all the towns and villages he planned to visit later. ²These were his instructions to them: "Plead with the Lord of the harvest to send out more laborers to help you, for the harvest is so plentiful and the workers so few. ³Go now, and remember that I am sending you out as lambs among wolves. Luke 10:1- 3 TLB

Jesus sent his twelve harvest hands out with this charge: "Don't begin by traveling to some far-off place to convert unbelievers. And don't try to be dramatic by tackling some public enemy. Go to the lost, confused people right here in the neighborhood. Tell them that the kingdom is here. Matthew 10:5-7 MSG

And he called his twelve disciples together and began sending them out two by two, giving them authority to cast out evil spirits. Mark 6:7

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." John 20:21

Jesus talking with the Father: Just as you sent me into the world, I am sending them into the world. John 17:18

To Paul - Yes, I am sending you to the Gentiles ... Acts 26:17b

Go [in your going about your daily life] therefore, make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28:19,20

So now I am sending you into all nations to teach them how to walk the road with me. You will represent me as you perform the purification ceremony [baptism] with them, *initiating them into the life of beauty and harmony represented* in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. You will then teach them all the ways that I have instructed you to walk in. Matthew 28:19,20 FNV

Read the verses again with our dwelling questions in mind:

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

What are you wondering about as you ponder God's Word?

What might Spirit be saying to you?

How might Spirit be nudging you to respond?

DIG

Notice that Jesus' followers are Jesus' sent ones... I am sending you.

What does that mean to you? How might it involve more than simply making a belief statement? (Can you be a Christian and not a sent one?)

How are you living as Christ's sent one? How could you?

What excites you about being commissioned to represent Jesus and God's love for the world? What challenges (or scares) you about living more fully into your identity and calling as Christ's sent one in your neighbourhood?

As you ponder these things, recall that 'the mission' is God's...not ours.

"Fundamentally, our mission (if it is biblically informed and validated) means our committed participation as God's people, at God's invitation and command, in God's own mission within the history of God's world for the redemption of the whole of God's creation." Christopher Wright, *The Mission of God* (63, 67). (23).

How are you hearing God's invitation and command? How could you?

How are you discovering and joining Spirit in God's world for the redemption of the whole of God's creation? How could you?

Choose your word for the day and write it on a stone on your listening labyrinth.

DO

Journal about being God's Sent One:

- How does it feel to imagine yourself in this way?
- What are you noticing as you seek to live into this identity in your daily life?
- What might it mean for you to more fully discover and join Spirit on God's mission in your neighbourhood?

Consider how your neighbours see you.

o What does what they see/know about you tell them about who you are, who God is--What it means to be a Christ follower?

Continue to 'saunter' around your neighbourhood. As you do, ponder these questions...

- What do I want/need to learn about my neighbourhood? About myself? About where God might be at work in my neighbourhood?
- What might God be up to in my neighbourhood?
- How might the practice of good listening help me in seeking to discover and join Spirit on God's mission in my neighbourhood?

DAY FOUR: So Loved

What is love? How would you define/describe it? How might your partner, family, neighbours, friends, answer that question? Why not, ask a few of them!

DWELL

Jesus often answers that question with a story or parable. Which ones come to mind for you? Today and tomorrow, we pause to ponder what is often called "the Parable of the Good Samaritan" again for the first time.

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, and invite Spirit's leading. Dwell in the text...

Read the passage slowly, contemplatively: What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting- why not highlight them)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

Luke 10:25-37

An expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ²⁶ He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" ²⁷ He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself." ²⁸ And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

But wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" ³⁰ Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³ But a Samaritan while traveling came upon him, and when he saw him, he was moved with compassion. ³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, treating them with oil and wine. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him, and when I come back I will repay you whatever more you spend.' ³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" ³⁷ He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

Read the passage again imagining Jesus as the 'good Samaritan.'

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

What are you wondering about as you ponder God's Word?

What might Spirit be saying to you?

How might Spirit be nudging you to respond?

DIG

Where /who are you in the story?

Where/who, do you think, are your neighbours?

"The pattern is broken by the Samaritan who, contrary to all expectation, does not leave. From then on, each line describes an action (seven in all) on the part of the Samaritan in service to the wounded man. The list is long because the Samaritan must make up for the actions of everyone else. He compensates tor their failures in an inverse order." Kenneth Bailey, *Through Peasant Eyes*, 41

What does the Samaritan do (the seven actions) in contrast to/"to compensate for the failures of" the priest and Levite?

What strikes you about the Samaritan and his risky and costly compassion? How much is he willing to risk and to pay? How might these actions describe what Jesus does?

Consider these verses:

'The Jews answered him, "Are we not right in saying that you are a Samaritan and have a demon?"' John 8:48

For I will restore health to you, and your wounds I will heal, says the Lord... Jer.30:17

If Jesus is identifying Himself as the good Samaritan, what might be some of the implications?

Consider...

If Jesus comes to us(you) as a Samaritan (despised, unclean, foreigner...) than...

If we're in the ditch than...

If God so loves than...

"The Samaritan is an unknown stranger. Yet, in spite of the cost in time, effort, money, and personal danger, he freely demonstrates unexpected love to the one in need." Kenneth Bailey, 54

Doesn't this sound like the kind of love that God offers us?

How are you receiving God's great love for you in the other, i.e. your neighbour?

Journal about being so loved by Jesus, the rejected outsider, Who saves you.

How does it feel to imagine yourself in the ditch, perhaps in contrast to how you have previously understood this parable?

What are you noticing as you seek to recognize and receive God's love in this way?

Choose your word for the day and write it on your listening labyrinth.

DO

'Listening' in our neighbourhoods is about being fully present with our neighbours so that we can discern what God is up to and join Spirit there. In Go Local (a Resonate initiative), we recognize that there are four neighbourhood places where we can engage this listening practice:

At home: In our own front yards/ verandahs/steps balconies	On our block/ street/lane
In community spaces	In neighbourhood
like the coffee shop,	groups like the soccer
park, school, grocery	team, book club, local
store, library	volunteer association

Try to spend an hour in one or more of these places today, perhaps with a neighbour, family member or friend.

What do you notice? What catches your attention, makes you wonder?

What might Spirit be celebrating? - lamenting?

Consider the parable in the context of your neighbourhood:

Who might be deemed the outsider? How are you and your neighbours reacting to them? What if Jesus is at work in and through *them*?

Where do you see evidence of God's love through 'the Samaritan'? How are you responding and joining in? How could you?

What might God be saying to you?

How might you discover more of God's love for God's world right where you live?

Prayer Prompt

DAY FIVE: For God so Loves our Neighbours

DWELL

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, and invite Spirit's leading.

Look back at the words on your "stones." What might God be saying to you?

Focus your attention on the text. Read the passage again for the first time, slowly, contemplatively:

Luke 10:25-37 MSG

- ²⁵ Just then a religion scholar stood up with a question to test Jesus. "Teacher, what do I need to do to get eternal life?"
- ²⁶ He answered, "What's written in God's Law? How do you interpret it?"
- ²⁷He said, "That you love the Lord your God with all your passion and prayer and muscle and intelligence—and that you love your neighbor as well as you do yourself."
- ²⁸ "Good answer!" said Jesus. "Do it and you'll live."
- 29 Looking for a loophole, he asked, "And just how would you define 'neighbor'?"
- ³⁰⁻³² Jesus answered by telling a story. "There was once a man traveling from Jerusalem to Jericho. On the way he was attacked by robbers. They took his clothes, beat him up, and went off leaving him half-dead. Luckily, a priest was on his way down the same road, but when he saw him he angled across to the other side. Then a Levite religious man showed up; he also avoided the injured man.
- ³³⁻³⁵ "A Samaritan traveling the road came on him. When he saw the man's condition, his heart went out to him. He gave him first aid, disinfecting and bandaging his wounds. Then he lifted him onto his donkey, led him to an inn, and made him comfortable. In the morning he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper, saying, 'Take good care of him. If it costs any more, put it on my bill—I'll pay you on my way back.'
- ³⁶ "What do you think? Which of the three became a neighbor to the man attacked by robbers?" ³⁷ "The one who treated him kindly," the religion scholar responded.

Jesus said, "Go and do the same."

Reread the passage, guided by these dwelling (listening) questions...

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

What are you wondering about as you ponder God's Word?

What might Spirit be saying to you?

How might Spirit be nudging you to respond?

DIG

Notice Jesus' instructions (imperatives).

The lawyer has asked about eternal life, but Jesus widens the discussion to include **all of life now**; a present result of a present action: It's not about 'the after life' but life today! (Present tense, verses 28 and 37) Jesus is saying:

Do this now and now you will live.

Do this and you will come alive!

Do this and you are living.

How might loving God and our neighbours bring us to life; be life?

How have you/your congregation experienced the life-giving significance of keeping the great commandment?

What makes loving God and neighbour so important, so central to being who God has already called and made us to be, and to discovering, pointing to and participating in God's mission?

The verb 'do' is also a present imperative meaning "Keep on doing" --

"It's a command for an open-ended ongoing lifestyle of unlimited and unqualified love for God and people." Kenneth Bailey, *Through Peasant Eyes*, 37.

Notice how Jesus identifies love of God and neighbour as one commandment:

'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength...' And 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." Mark 12:29-31

How do Jesus' life and teachings illustrate this? For example, in this parable, loving neighbour takes precedence over keeping the 'religious laws' as we also discover when Jesus' heals on the sabbath, forgives rather than throwing a stone, interacts with women, tax collectors and 'other sinners', and so on.

How might you live this commandment more fully?

Pause for a couple of minutes of personal reflection (listening)...

I learned that...

I sensed God saying...

I will...

For Jesus, everything is shaped toward becoming people who love God and who love others, and nothing less than a life absorbed in love is sufficient to describe what a Christian is for Him. Scot McKnight, <u>One.Life</u>- <u>Jesus Calls We Follow</u>, 47.

Choose your word for the day and write it on your 'stone' labyrinth.

DO

Faithful Jews have said the 'Shema' (Hear O Israel...) every morning for centuries. In light of that practice, repeat what has been called the Jesus Creed (the Great Commandment-see above, Mark 12:29-31) throughout your day.

What would happen if you were to say it every morning? How might this practice impact your day? How might you live it out?

As you hang out in your neighbourhood today (in any or all four places, (see Day Four, DO), have a conversation with a few neighbours about what makes a good neighbour.

Be sure to listen well and to take note of (remember/journal about) their responses.

As Jesus unveiled God before a surprised and unready world, so must we. Love is that important. ... Our love must 'come in the flesh', just as God's love did. -- N.T. Wright

We have no choice but to live out the command of God with those near and quite specific neighbors with whom we share our human existence. I cannot evade the command of God that comes to me through the neighbor who shares my space and whose life I am bound up in common personal and social identity.

Anderson, *The Shape of Practical Theology,* 146-47.

DIG

Today, let's ponder "the world" used 3 times in two verses. What do you think that includes?

The word in Greek is kosmos, or, as we spell it in English, cosmos.

For God so loves the cosmos --the whole world, the universe! God is about the salvation, the restoration, the redemption of all things, a new earth and heaven—and we get to witness and bear witness to it!

"...we know that this is truly the Savior of the world." John 4:42

For the mission of God is as universal as the love of God and as Psalm 145:13 reminds us, "The Lord is faithful to all his promises and loving toward all he has made." Christopher Wright, 393.

God's mission is the redemption and restoration of both humanity and his whole creation completely, in every realm of life, whether spiritual or social. Mike Aubrey

What might be the implications for you/us of God's mission being about all of creation, for God so loves the world?

What signs of God's great love for the world--including your neighbourhood, have you noticed this week?

What might your neighbourhood look like if God's dream/desire for it was fulfilled? List some words that come to mind (like inclusive, safe, abundant, beautiful, harmonious, flourishing...)

The discipline of nurturing good places means inhabiting them, believing in them, investing in them and doing everything we can to make them fully human. ...investing both resources and energy in order to create a community of shalom; a community of completeness and wholeness in which people individually and collectively experience health, prosperity, security and spiritual renewal. How might you discover and participate in nurturing that kind of 'good place' right where you live?

How might you, in your everyday life and neighbourhood, grow in loving God's whole world like God does, such that others 'will know'?

Choose your word for the day and write it on your 'stone' labyrinth.

DO

Pay attention to *your world* today. What are neighbours talking about/concerned about? Where might creation, human and non-human, be groaning?

Have a conversation or two with some neighbours about their ideas of the ideal neighbourhood. You might even ask them, "If there is a good God, what do you think God's dream for our neighbourhood would be?"

As you imagine your community as one that reflects God's Kingdom come near, what quality of that 'good place' do you feel most drawn to? How might Spirit be at work, *making it so*? Undertake one small action towards joining in with God's good work of *making it so*.

For example, if you feel drawn to pointing to...

- God's abundance then share some of your abundance with your neighbourhood by joining your neighbourhood Buy Nothing Group or giving some of your garden produce to your neighbours. Better yet, with the help of a few other neighbours, have a produce exchange or host a 'bring what you've grown' front yard party!
- God's gift of beauty then thank your neighbours for their beautiful garden, join with other neighbours to clean up litter at your neighbourhood park.
- God's welcome and acceptance then be sure to connect with and include neighbours who are often excluded, or left on the margins.

Our purpose, our very being as God's people is for the sake of the reconciliation and healing of the whole world, God's Kingdom on earth. What, then, does the reign of God, manifested here and now in our midst, look like? Angie Ward (Editor), Kingdom and Country, 31.

Write a Japanese Haiku poem as you reflect and pray today. A Haiku poem follows a pattern of three lines with 5-7-5 syllables. For example:

Christ is victor: his rule has begun!
The Spirit is at work: creation is renewed!
Hallelujah! Praise the Lord!

Reflect and journal about your own life and attitude in relation to the world:

- Which of the two attitudes do you personally lean towards more, the control or the despair? How does that affect your engagement with God's work in the world? Bring any confession you might have to the Lord in prayer.
- How do you affirm that God is King, Christ is victor, and the Spirit is at work? What evidence do you see in your neighbourhood that "God has not abandoned the work of his hands"?
- As you encounter the "crises of our times," what difference does it make that "Our World Belongs to God"?

Day Seven: BELIEVE

DWELL

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, and invite Spirit's leading.

What do you believe? (Pause and answer that question in your own words.)

Dwell in the text, reading the passage slowly, contemplatively guided by these dwelling (listening) questions...

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

What are you wondering about as you ponder God's Word?

What might Spirit be saying to you?

How might Spirit be nudging you to respond?

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

John 3:16-18 (NRSV):

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved through him. Those who believe in him are not condemned, but those who do not believe are condemned already because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God.

Dwell in the passage again in a different translation:

John 3:16-18 First Nations Version (FNV):

"The Great Spirit loves this world of human beings so deeply he gave us his Son—the only Son who fully represents him. All who trust in him and his way will not come to a bad end, but will have the life of the world to come that never fades away, full of beauty and harmony. ¹⁷Creator did not send his Son to decide against the people of this world, but to set them free from the worthless ways of the world. ¹⁸"The ones who trust in him are released from their guilt, but, for the ones who turn away from him to follow the ways of this world, their guilt remains. This is because they are turning away from the life of beauty and harmony the Great Spirit offers through his Son.

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

What are you wondering about as you ponder God's Word?

What words or phrases stand out to you (is Spirit highlighting)? Why do you think they are catching your attention?

DIG

'Believe' is used four times in this short passage.

What do you think it actually means?

The verb in Greek, pisteuó, is not simply about making a statement about that which we affirm, sanction or mentally concur with.

To "believe" implies trust, reliance on and having confidence in, such that we act accordingly.

What do you believe? Consider how you answered that question. How might your answer change with this understanding of the word in mind?

What might be the implications of belief being more than a declaration-- for you? -- for your neighbours?

How do you trust and act on your faith/confidence in Jesus (i.e. follow Him)?

How do you share it? What in your ordinary everyday life bears witness to your 'belief' in God's great love for the world?

How might Spirit be at work out ahead of you inviting you to discern and participate in all that points to God's mission and love for the world?

What have you heard God saying? How will you respond?

Choose your word for the day and write it on your 'stone' labyrinth.

John 3:16 is a beautiful verse, understood this way-that God's act of sharing Jesus with us comes out of love, and that all who participate in that love through loving both God and one another follow in the Way of Jesus, which is the Way of eternity-to love Jesus so much that you imitate Him and follow His Way. To believe in His message so much that you follow it. Frank Lesko, What Makes a Christian?

DO

As you 'saunter' and connect with neighbours. listen for how people talk about what they believe. How do their actions demonstrate their 'beliefs'?

How do your actions demonstrate your 'beliefs' (what you trust in)?

As Spirit leads, take one simple step towards moving from strangers to acquaintances to relationship with a neighbour or two. For example, ask for 'a cup of sugar,' (be the humble, vulnerable one, Luke 10:3-8), go for a walk or a coffee together; participate in a block social or other gathering/event.

At the end of the day, think back (write down) all that you did. Reflect on what you felt, thought, and said as well.

How do you think 'your day' bore witness to your 'believing'?

What on your list are you... Thankful for? Regretting? Surprised by? Wondering about?

Consider where and how Spirit was at work, i.e. where you and others experienced goodness, joy, justice, grace, etc.

Where are you discerning Spirit's nudging?

What could you do in response? When will you do it?

DAY EIGHT: Eternal Life

DWELL

As you begin, pause, take a deep breath, and invite Spirit's leading.

What is 'eternal life'?

Dwell in the texts with that question in mind::

This is eternal life: that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom [God has] sent. John 17:3

I have come bearing the plentiful gifts of God; and all who receive Me will experience everlasting life, a new intimate relationship with You (the one True God) and Jesus the Anointed (the One You have sent). John 17:3 The Voice

John 10:10b

I came so everyone would have life, and have it fully. CEV

I came so they can have real and eternal life, more and better life than they ever dreamed of. MSG

My purpose is to give them a rich and satisfying life. John 10:10b NLT

My purpose is to give life in all its fullness. John 10:10b TLB

I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. **ESV**

I came that they may have *and* enjoy life, and have it in abundance [to the full, till it overflows].

I came to bring them life, and far more life than before. Phillips

God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. 1 John 4:9

God showed his love for us when he sent his only Son into the world to give us life. 1 John 4:9 CEV

As you dwell once more in our theme passage, consider how the above verses and these translations/paraphrases describe what has often been translated 'eternal life.'

John 3:16-18

"This is how much God loved the world: He gave his Son, his one and only Son. And this is why: so that no one need be destroyed; by believing in him, anyone can have a whole and lasting life. God didn't go to all the trouble of sending his Son merely to point an accusing finger, telling the world how bad it was. He came to help, to put the world right again. Anyone who trusts in him is acquitted; anyone who refuses to trust him has long since been under the death sentence without knowing it. And why? Because of that person's failure to believe in the one-of-a-kind Son of God when introduced to him. *Eugene Peterson, The Message*

God loved the whole world in this way: selflessly giving his only son so that all those who trust in and rely on him won't be lost or ruined but will share in the life of God's new paradigm. God didn't send his son, his emissary, his very self, into the whole world to put the cosmos on trial, but in order that the whole world might be saved from ruin and restored to health through him. <u>Paraphrase by Matte Downey</u>

¹⁶This, you see, is how God loved the world: by giving his only, special son, so that everyone who trusts in him should not be lost but should share in the life of God's new age. ¹⁷After all, God didn't send the son into the world to judge the world, but so that the world could be saved by him." Paul Nuechterlein, Girardian Lectionary

God gave his son "so that everyone who believes in him should not be lost but should share in the life of God's new age." N. T. Wright, John 3:16, New Testament for Everyone

DIG

If "eternal life" doesn't mean life after death in a heavenly realm beyond our space and time, what does it mean?

Read the verses again, and underline all the phrases describing this life in Christ.

How might 'eternal life' be about knowing (being in a relationship with) God (John 17:3)?

How might it be about a 'rich and satisfying' life in God's new age, here and now, full and flourishing?

The phrase, "eternal life" has often been misunderstood in recent church history, as Biblical scholars and theologians like NT Wright explain:

There we are, think average Christian readers. This is the biblical promise of a timeless heavenly bliss.

But it isn't. In the many places where the phrase 'zoe aionios' [eternal life] appears in the gospels, and in Paul's letters for that matter, it refers to one aspect of an ancient Jewish belief about how time was divided up. In this viewpoint, there were two "aions" (we sometimes use the word "eon" in that sense): the "Present age," 'ha-olam hazeh' in Hebrew, and the "age to come," ha-olam ha-ba. The "age to come," many ancient Jews believed, would arrive one day to bring God's justice, peace, and healing to the world as it groaned and toiled within the "present age." You can see

Paul, for instance, referring to this idea in Galatians 1:4, where he speaks of Jesus giving himself for our sins "to rescue us from the present evil age."

In other words, Jesus has inaugurated, ushered in, the "age to come." But there is no sense that this "age to come" is "eternal" in the sense of being outside space, time, and matter. Far from it. The ancient Jews were creational monotheists. For them, God's great future purpose was not to rescue people out of the world, but to rescue the world itself, people included, from its present state of corruption and decay. (NT Wright, How God Became King: The Forgotten Story of the Gospels pp. 44-45)

What might be the implications of this understanding of 'eternal life' – for you, –for your neighbours, –for what it means to participate in God's mission?

How have you seen and experienced God rescuing the world itself?

How have you seen and experienced 'eternal life'- rich and satisfying, whole and lasting, full, abundant, flourishing, God's new paradigm?

How will you continue to discover, join in and share God's new paradigm with your neighbours?

Choose your last word for this devotional labyrinth, write it on a stone and reflect on all the words that you have added as you have participated in this "Listen and Love" journey as part of Resonate's Mission Emphasis Week, 2022.
